On paper or in theory, it was supposed to be a match made in heaven—a perfect marriage of writer Daphne du Maurier's psychological novel "Rebecca" with master filmmaker Alfred Hitchcock's darkly enchanting sensibilities. The result is an eerie, atmospheric masterpiece that will haunt you for days. The story is based on the classic novel by Daphne du Maurier (1937), which has been filmed several times before, including Hitchcock's own version in 1940. In this version, a young woman (Jodie Foster) travels to the Cornish coast of England to join her husband-to-be (Gregory Peck) at his mammoth estate called Manderley. She is welcomed by the housekeeper Mrs. Danvers (Judith Anderson in a chilling performance), a woman whose fondness for her dead mistress Rebecca makes her a deadly enemy for our heroine. This film must have been a labor of love for Hitchcock, whose own wife had died the year before making the movie. The result is an atmospheric, haunting story that will leave you both thrilled and chilled to the core. The cast is uniformly excellent, with Anderson's portrayal of Mrs. Danvers' devotion to Rebecca perfect in every way, and Peck giving a great performance as the haunted widower who wants desperately to be loved again.
