And we supported Iceland and other small states when their financial systems started to collapse. If the UK can continue to give this level of support in our own national crisis, then we should. The choice is not between a bigger state or a smaller state, but between a state that helps its people, and a state that does not. Yes, we have seen very expensive failures which we have to pay for. But we have learned what not to do. The UK is not on the edge of a precipice. We do not need to be afraid. We need to be determined. We will be better for our children and grandchildren than we have been for the past couple of generations. There is no threat. There is no collapse. We are on the brink of a great transformation. None of this is to imply that we should not be afraid. But we should be afraid of what we were told a while ago. The UK is broke. The welfare state is broken. We are even told we are going to have an 'age of austerity'. Our children and our grandchildren are going to live in a richer, healthier, happier Britain. The system we have has failed. It cannot carry on for ever. We need to be bold, inventive and creative. And very imaginative. Who would have thought that one of the less economically powerful parts of Europe could be the birthplace of the post-national state? Not me, that's for sure.
